

"KING AND MESSIAH

Consider the words of the hymn, "The exaltation of the Cross," in the orthodox Church:

O Cross of Christ, the Christian Hope.

Guide of the wanderers, haven of the storm-tossed.

Victory in warfare, firm foundation of the world.

Physician of the sick, resurrection of the dead.

Have mercy upon us.

The Cross is the guardian of the whole earth.

The Cross is the beauty of the Church.

The Cross is the strength of kings.

The cross is the angel's glory, the demons' destruction.

Did you know that this is the hymn sang in orthodox Churches during the Christ the King Sunday? Very strange! The proclamation is very clear: "Today is a day of glory, exaltation and majesty!"

Paul writing to the Colossians describes Jesus as "...the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation, ¹⁶ for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him (Colossians 1:15-16). The absolute fullness of divinity resides in Jesus. JESUS IS THE FULL EXPRESSION OF WHO AND WHAT GOD IS. The world of reconciliation and salvation have been accomplished by Jesus. Jesus brings God's true peace as the Messiah or Anointed One.

Easily lost in in our time is the kind of King and Messiah we have in Jesus. Paul clearly indicates that Jesus defeated powers of darkness and brought peace "through the blood of his cross" (Colossians 1:13, 20). Redemption and forgiveness of sin did not come easily. Jesus had to lay down his life for us. There can be no talk of crown and glory without the cross and humiliation. There is no resurrection and empty tomb without the agony of Gethsemane and the cross of Good Friday. Jesus is the King and Messiah wo is rejected by the elders, suffers and is put to death. We are able "to share the lot of the saints in light" because Jesus through his death and resurrection offers us the Light of Life. This is meaning of the birth of Jesus.

In Luke 23:35-43, the reaction of the crowd to Jesus on the Cross continues throughout history: "The people stood there watching, and the leaders kept jeering at Jesus, saying, 'He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, the chosen one." People continue to jeer. We have always had trouble with a messiah who would suffer and die. Maybe it is the "Peter-complex." That is, we are comfortable with the Messiah of glory, but not with the Messiah who s the Suffering Servant. We like Jesus on Mount Tabor, but we find it hard to follow him to Calvary. We are with Jesus as he makes the rounds healing, preaching, and working miracles. But we find it hard to remain in his company when we must keep fellowship with him in the Garden. We too fall off to sleep because our spirit and flesh are weak.

We want a Messiah who is King. We want a Messiah who is never found on the Cross in the first place. So why do we have a King from the Cross? Again, the gospel of Luke 23:35-43 provides a powerful response. Jesus is not the Cross because we need him to be. We find both thieves within us. We want Jesus to get off the Cross and make everything alright. We want the quick fix and the bold display of power. At the same time, we also realize that Jesus must remain if we are to hear these words: "I assure you, this day you will be with me in paradise."

As we enter into the depths of Advent Season and looking forward the Christmastide Season, we are called to proclaim the Jesus is King-the Messiah that was promised by God in the past, is indeed a King. But remember that he is a King who rules from the Cross with the power of suffering love.

He comes as a child in a stable.

BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN CHRIST:

Greetings in the name of our Lord.

We just received a response from our District Superintendent Rev. Moody Colorado with regards to our request for Special Charge Conference on Disaffiliation. He provided a schedule for us on **Sunday, January 8, 2023**.

For the past year we have been discerning and have been talking about the direction that the UMC has been taking after the 2019 Special General Conference. Beginning this year, our Bishop and her cabinet, continue to violate the Book of Discipline and even by action, construed as *Ultra Vires*, defied the decision of the General Conference and failed to implement provisions of the Book of Discipline that relates to same-sex marriage. This coming January 8 during worship, we will settle this dividing issue.

Further, we need to ask what matters in the heart of faith and what matters to our Lord Jesus, if Jesus indeed is Lord and God. Two questions emerged from our discerning process:

CAN THE CHURCH SANCTION SAME-SEX MARRIAGE? OR WHY CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE IS ONE MAN-ONE WOMAN?

Remember that true faith is "that which has been believed by the Christian Community everywhere, always, and by all." The traditional doctrine that marriage is man-woman monogamy meets the classic criteria of Biblical Faith:

IT HAS BEEN BELIEVED EVERYWHERE (universality), 2) ALWAYS (antiquity), 3)AND BY ALL CHRISTIANS (consensus).

Because we have to take the PRIMACY AND RELEVANCE OF THE BIBLE WITH UTMOST SERIOUSNESS, we have to take into consideration the following:

JUSTIFICATION IS RESPONSIBILITY OF JUSTIFICATION

Meaning, "IF YOU ARE CHANGING SOMETHING, YOU HAVE THE RESPONSIBILITY TO JUSTIFY."

Because sanctioning same-sex union would require substantially revising biblical faith, I assume that advocates of innovation bear the responsibility of justification.

What we confess about who Jesus is, matters to how we think about what marriage is.

Thus, because we are dealing with what matters most in our faith, I encourage you to pray hard. Pray hard because on the ballot is not just simply disaffiliating or remaining in the UMC but on the ballot is Jesus, the primacy of the Scripture and the traditional faith of the Bible.

Only you can discern with the help of the Holy Spirit.

Memorial, Lisa reported the sound system has been paid in full thanks to extra memorials being received.

He read from the Book of Discipline about the definition of marriage, the views of human sexuality and the Chargeable Offenses pertaining to a pastor performing same sex marriage.

We will be having a Charge Conference January 8th to discuss and vote on possibly disaffiliating from the United Methodist Church and join the Global Methodist Church. District Superintendent, Moody Colorado will be here to facilitate the discussion and vote.

Gideon made a 2 part motion. 1 That Gladbrook UMC will disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church

2 that the Gladbrook UMC will join the Global Methodist Church if the disaffiliation is approved.

He also asked Dana B., Dave K., Lisa K., and Kevin W. to count the votes on January 8th. All parts of the motion were approved There was some discussion to clarify that this vote will take place during the Sunday morning worship service. All members of the church are strongly urged to attend that Sunday to participate in the vote. There will be no early voting or absentee voting. If you, as a member of the church, want to vote you must be at the service on January 8th. The motion to disaffiliate must pass by a 2/3 majority. The vote to join the Global Methodist church needs a simple majority to pass.

New Business: 1. Angel Tree Giving is open. Angel tags with a child in need are available on the front lobby table. Please fill out the information on the clipboard next to the tags. All gifts must be returned to the church before non on December 14th.

2. **On the agenda for January** will be the approval of nominated officers for 2023 year. The nomination lists were submitted to the office this afternoon. Dana has not had time to organize the lists into one cohesive form for our approval before this evenings meeting

Joys 1. Susie's sister, Ann, is doing well. She will be having radiation every Monday through Friday for 30 days.

Herb Butter Thanksgiving Turkey Recipe by Dana Brown

Ingredients


14-16 pound turkey thawed

- 3 stalks of celery cut into 2 inch chunks
- 2 carrots cut into 2 inch chunks
- 1 medium onion cut into wedges
- 1 lemon cut into wedges
- 1 orange cut into wedges
- 1 apple cut into 2 inch chunks
- 8 tablespoons butter (1 stick) softened
- 3 cloves minced into paste
- 1 tablespoon Poultry seasoning

kosher salt and freshly ground pepper

2 cartons of turkey or chicken broth

- 1. Remove turkey neck and giblets. Pat turkey dry, inside and out and season inside liberally with salt and ground pepper.
- 2. Place in a roasting bag in a large roasting pan.
- 3. Cut veggies and fruit into large chunks. Combine in one large bowl.
- 4. Fill turkey cavity with the chunks of veggies and fruits. If you have fruit and veggies left, place them inside the roasting bag around the turkey.
- 5. Combine softened butter with poultry seasoning, 1/2 teaspoon of freshly ground black pepper, garlic that has been minced into paste.
- 6. Gently loosen skin from turkey breast and turkey legs and spread garlic herb butter <u>under</u> the skin.
- 7. Tuck wing tips under and use extra skin at base of backbone to tuck turkey legs together. You can also use cooking twine for this step, if preferred. Spread remaining softened butter all over outside of turkey and season liberally with kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper.
- 8. Pour broth into the roasting bag.
- 9. Roasted at 450 degrees for one hour, then decrease temperature to 350 degrees and roast for another 2 to 3 hours depending on size of turkey. Begin checking turkey for doneness at the 3 hour mark. Turkey is done when breast meat registers 165 degrees and thigh meat is 170-175 degrees. IMPORTANT Let turkey rest one hour before carving.
- 10. If cooking the day before serving, let the cooked turkey cool for 1 hour before refrigerating overnight. Day of serving, carve the cold turkey, return turkey to the roaster bag, discard the cooked fruits and veggies. Retain the broth for an excellent gravy. Heat turkey. ENJOY!
